Dan Habib is the creator of *Including Samuel* and the new film *Who Cares About Kelsey?* Habib is the Filmmaker in Residence at the Institute on Disability at the University of New Hampshire. Until joining UNH in April of 2008, Habib was the photography editor of the Concord (NH) Monitor. In 2006 and 2008, he was named the national Photography Editor of the Year for papers with a circulation under 100,000.

'Who Cares About Kelsey?'

When Kelsey Carroll entered high school, she was a more likely candidate for the juvenile justice system than graduation. Diagnosed with ADHD and carrying the emotional scars of homelessness and substance abuse, as well as the actual scars of repeated self-mutilation, Kelsey was volatile, disruptive and, by her own admission, "not a nice person" to be around. As a freshman at Somersworth (NH) High School, she didn't earn a single academic credit, but she did get suspended for dealing drugs. During Kelsey's sophomore year, a new school principal implemented dramatic reforms to improve the school's culture and reduce the dropout rate. This school-wide overhaul gave Kelsey a chance at a different outcome. *Who Cares About Kelsey?* follows Kelsey through the ups and downs of her senior year. As the film delves into Kelsey's life, we watch her navigate the halls and classrooms of her school and the fraught terrain of family and romantic relationships. Kelsey interacts with a military father who questions her account of the past and dismisses her plans for the future. She manages her relationship with a mother trying to atone for past failures that set in motion some of Kelsey's most destructive behaviors. She spends much of her time with a boyfriend she cherishes but whose loyalty and support for Kelsey's newly forming independence are uncertain. Along the way, a team of trusted adults meets with her weekly. She tells them her dreams and fears, planning a future she might never have let herself picture a few years earlier. *Who Cares About Kelsey?* will make viewers reconsider the "problem kids" in their own high schools and spark new conversations about an education revolution that's about empowering--not overpowering--our most emotionally and behaviorally challenged youth.

Dan and his wife, Betsy, live in Concord, New Hampshire, with their sons Isaiah, 15, and Samuel, 11.

JoAnne M. Malloy is a Clinical Assistant Professor in the School of Social Work and the Institute on Disability at the University of New Hampshire. Dr. Malloy received a Masters Degree in Social Work Administration and Planning from the University of Tennessee in 1981 and a Doctorate of Philosophy in Education from the University of New Hampshire in April 2011. She joined the staff of

Institute on Disability (NH's University Center for Excellence in Disability) in 1991 where she has directed several state and federally-funded employment and dropout prevention projects. In 1996, she directed a demonstration project to create employment opportunities for youth with emotional and behavioral disabilities. The model developed as a result of the project, known as RENEW (Rehabilitation, Empowerment, natural supports, Education, and Work), has resulted in positive outcomes for youth with emotional and behavioral disorders and at risk youth in educational, mental health and juvenile detention settings.

The RENEW model, developed in New Hampshire in 1996, has proven to be an effective version of wraparound specifically designed to assist youth with emotional and behavioral challenges to transition from school to adult life. This session will provide hands-on experience with two of the primary elements of the RENEW process: futures planning using graphic facilitation, and team building and facilitation. The session will include a brief description of the theoretical base for the RENEW design, the results of several research projects, how RENEW is being implemented in several NH high schools as the tertiary level intervention in a 3-tiered PBIS model, and by community mental health centers with adolescent clients. The session will then include a description of the model and a demonstration of the person-centered planning process using graphic facilitation. Individuals will have a chance to process and practice in small groups using case examples. The session will conclude with a discussion and questions and answers about the RENEW process.



Jonathon Drake received a Masters Degree in Social Work with a focus on policy, community organizing, systems, management and research from the University of New Hampshire in 2006. During his course of study, Jonathon also received a Graduate Certificate in Leadership in Children's Health and Disability. Jonathon is currently the Project Training Director for the RENEW Capacity Building Project, designed to build sustainability for RENEW in the NH mental health system by training clinicians to use the RENEW model as an evidence based mental health intervention for youth with emotional and/or behavioral disorders. Mr. Drake also provides wraparound training with local organizations based on the national wraparound initiative model.
